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## Matter 12 : The Historic Environment

The Local Plan's hierarchy of settlements (DLP01 Section 4, *Spatial Strategy*, page 37) defines Cumnor as "a larger village", one where development should only take place to meet a village's "local needs". It states (in *Core Policy 13*, page 63) that future development in GB villages like Cumnor should be allocated only "within the existing built area of the village". It is unsound to proceed with extensive releases of GB land that (a) lie *outside* the village and (b) where the village has no need to expand for its own purposes.

The Parish Council is embarking on a Neighbourhood Plan to identify other sites that might be suitable for development in due course. It should be noted that in Stage 1 Written Statements JPPC, acting on behalf of South Cumnor Landowners, stated that the "identification of smaller site allocations...would ensure housing delivery" (Matter 1, paragraph 16<sup>1</sup>). Rather than unrealistic wholesale removals from the GB, a more targeted and incremental approach would be more democratic, achievable and deliverable.

## Matter 12.3 (c): The Historic Environment

The Conservation area in Cumnor exists to protect the historic heritage and special character of Cumnor. Release of the sites 5, 6 and 24 from the GB would result in the destruction of the special character of this important historical settlement.

Area 6 covers most of the area of the medieval deer park, attached to the Abbot of Abingdon's country house, which stood to the west of the church until 1810 (and of which fragments survive): although much altered, the planned medieval landscape and arrangement of church, manor house, park, garden, barn and fishponds remains entirely legible. This is a very rare and very interesting survival, not least in what it tells us and may yet tell us about life and environment in Cumnor during the last millennium, and which retains buildings and specific features offering very real contact with our communal past.

The whole area surrounding Cumnor is steeped in associations that are intrinsic to the historic and literary character of Oxford and Oxfordshire. It is, for example, the site of Matthew Arnold's famous poem 'The Scholar Gypsy' which is a landmark in English literature studied throughout the world.

Matthew Arnold's famous poem 'The Scholar Gipsy'. Arnold is one of the most significant cultural figures of the Victorian period, and this poem is studied throughout the world. Arnold pointedly celebrates the essence of this area's special position as rural and green, despite its close proximity to Oxford, as in this extract:

"Screen'd is this nook o'er the high, half-reap'd field,

And here till sun-down, shepherd! will I be.

Through the thick corn the scarlet poppies peep,

And round green roots and yellowing stalks I see

Pale pink convolvulus in tendrils creep;

And air-swept lindens yield

Their scent, and rustle down their perfumed showers

Of bloom on the bent grass where I am laid,

And bower me from the August sun with shade;

And the eye travels down to Oxford's towers."

In addition, Thomas Hardy used various Cumnor scenes in his descriptions of the fictional 'Lumsdon' in his great novel Jude the Obscure (1895), and much of the action of Sir Walter Scott's Kenilworth (1821) takes place in Cumnor, in and around the manor house, its grounds and park, which formed the core of the village and are now part of the Vale's area 6.
