Data note 3 – First release of data from Census 2011 survey shows changing population in Oxfordshire's districts



Introduction

- The Office for National Statistics has published the first set of data from the Census survey carried out on 27th March 2011.
- This dataset includes population by five year age band at local authority level, residents living in communal establishments and short term migrants.
- Data at ward, parish and sub-ward level and other statistics including ethnicity, health and economic activity will be published from November 2012.



Comparing 2011 to 2001

❖ There has been a growth in population in all of Oxfordshire's districts over the 10 years between 2001 and 2011, however there is a significant difference between Oxford city and rural Oxfordshire districts in the changes to the older and younger populations.


Children


- There has been a decline in the number of children aged 0-9 in South Oxfordshire and the Vale of White Horse.
- This is in contrast to Oxford city where this younger population increased by 26%.



Older people

- Overall Oxfordshire's population has aged.
- The biggest increase in the number of people aged 75+ was in South Oxfordshire and the Vale of White Horse (+2,000 in each district).
- Oxford's population aged 75+ declined by 600 residents.

- ❖ Just over 2% of the usual resident population in each district live in communal establishments with the exception of Oxford where the proportion is 12%.
- Short term migrants (people who have lived or intend to live in the UK for three months or more but less than 12 months) are not counted in the Census total. There were 5,500 short term migrants in Oxfordshire at the time of the 2011 Census, the majority in Oxford.

What is a communal establishment?

A communal establishment is an establishment providing managed residential accommodation. 'Managed' in this context means full-time or part-time supervision of the accommodation, including:

- Sheltered accommodation units where fewer than 50 per cent of the units in the establishment have their own cooking facilities, or similar accommodation where elderly people have their own rooms, but the main meal is provided.
- Hotels, quest houses, B&Bs and inns and pubs with residential accommodation with room for 10 or more quests.
- Student accommodation..
 - All accommodation provided solely for students (during term-time) is defined as communal. This includes
 university-owned cluster flats, houses and apartments located within student villages, and similar accommodation
 owned by a private company and provided solely for students.
 - o A pragmatic approach will need to be taken with university-owned student houses that are difficult to identify and are not clearly located with other student residences. In this case, they should be enumerated as households.
 - Houses rented to students by private landlords are counted as households.

Note that the comparison between 2001 and 2011 has been made using the ONS mid-year estimate from 2001 in preference to the 2001 Census. This is because the ONS made an upward adjustment after reviewing the 2001 Census results which it applied to the mid-year estimate but NOT to the 2001 Census data.

Next release of Census 2011 data due November 2012

Quick and Key Statistics will be released by the ONS from November 2012 to February 2013 in three phases.

- In the first phase data will be published for "statistical areas" including sub-ward super output areas.
- The second phase will be at ward level.
- The third phase will be at the remaining geographies. This includes parishes, health areas, postcode sectors, and national parks.
- Each of the phases will be released via the ONS website. The Neighbourhood Statistics website will also release 2011 Census statistics at output area, Ward and Parish level.

Data to be published from November 2012 will include:

- Living arrangements
- Country of birth, ethnic group, main language, religion, passports held, household language, national identity, length of residency in the UK
- Health and provision of unpaid care
- Economic activity, hours worked.



- The Census 2011 estimate for Cherwell is 1,500 above the ONS estimate for 2010 and close to the ONS population projections.
- Cherwell's 2011 population of 141,900 is above the County Council's housing-based population estimates by over 7,000.



- Oxford's 2011 population of 151,900 is above the County Council's housing-based population estimates by over 4,500.





- The Census 2011 estimate for Vale of White Horse is very close to the revised ONS estimate for 2010 and the ONS population projections.
- Vale of White Horse's 2011 population of 121,000 is (rounded) the same as predicted by the County Council population estimates.
